



FOUNDATION PROFILE: WHAT WE DO

In 2008, after several years of funding a wide variety of educational programs, the foundation adopted a more focused grantmaking strategy centered on **high-achieving**, **lower-income youth**. Our priorities have centered on the following goals:



A STRONG EARLY FOUNDATION

We believe breaking the cycle of poverty starts with high quality early childhood education.

OUR GOAL: to increase the number of lower-income students who enter Kindergarten as high-achievers (at or above grade-level norms) and achieve reading proficiency by third grade.

ACCESS TO QUALITY ENRICHMENT IN ACADEMICS AND THE ARTS

We believe out-of-school time learning provides enriching, transformational experiences, and the arts are essential for youth development and innovation.



OUR GOAL: to increase the number of lower-income students who perform at the highest levels of achievement in academics and the arts.



QUALITY SCHOOL OPTIONS

We believe all families deserve the right to choose a quality education for their children.

OUR GOAL: to expand the capacity of high performing charter schools that serve predominantly lower-income students.

POST SECONDARY SUCCESS






HOW OUR GRANTMAKING HAS EVOLVED



GRANT TYPES




"Other" focus area includes grants that were issued early in the foundation's giving that are outside of the focus today, and discretionary grants.

OVER TIME, THE FOUNDATION HAS GRANTED MORE THAN \$10 MILLION TO ARTS AND ACADEMIC OUT-OF-SCHOOL TIME ENRICHMENT PROGRAMS FOR UNDER-SERVED YOUTH. EACH HAS RECEIVED ABOUT 2X MORE FUNDING THAN ANY OTHER FOCUS AREA.

As our founder Neil Webber says, there is value in the diversity of approaches to philanthropy. We don't claim to do philanthropy right or best; rather, we work to align the foundation's resources with our interests, our values, and the community's needs.

Over the last two decades, we've made hundreds of grants that have helped define what success looks like for the Webber Family Foundation. The most impactful grants are those that speak to the head - through strong outcomes backed by data - and the heart, allowing us to share the joy of students who achieve their dreams and leaders who are rightfully proud of their work.

Success at the Webber Family Foundation means focusing on leadership, taking risks, investing in nimble non-profits rather than in public systems, and leveraging our networks to amplify our grant-making.



FOCUSING ON LEADERS

We've learned that a great idea is not a great investment unless the leadership is also great. What does "great" look like among our grantees? The most successful CEOs are

- **inspiring** in their love of the work, belief in their students, and passion for change.
- adaptive, able to respond to changing circumstances with resourcefulness and innovation. They listen, learn, and modify their approaches on the basis of what's happening outside their doors.
- generous, top-notch collaborators who talk openly about successes and failures, build effective partnerships, take time to mentor emerging leaders, and share credit willingly.
- **team builders** providing feedback systems, opportunities for career growth, and leadership development for staff; harnessing the power of the board and volunteers; and making plans for succession.

Time and again, we've learned that the Executive Director/CEO is the key driver of success - for strategy, execution, partnerships and sustainability. We're grateful to have supported and learned from so many exceptional leaders over the years.



INVESTING IN OUT-OF-SCHOOL TIME

Early in the foundation's life we made the decision to fund outside the school system where the impact of our dollars would be greater. We believed then, as now, that the hours after school and during the summer hold huge opportunities for students to explore their passions, build relationships with caring adults, and develop skills and knowledge that will fuel their success later in life.

We continue to see more opportunities in the out-of-school-time space to partner, leverage funding and innovate, especially as school districts' K-12 budgets continue to be stretched to the max.

EMBRACING RISK

As a private foundation, we have the freedom to take risks with our grants. We can bet on social entrepreneurs, fund the testing of new approaches, and be patient, curious, and helpful with grantees when their initial attempts to solve a problem fail.

The foundation has been the first-in funder for several organizations that have become major community players. We've provided seed money for pilot programs, new staff positions, and partnerships. Our support has provided critical dollars for start-up expenses and credibility for promising leaders. In addition, we've experienced the joy of seeing ideas grow into thriving organizations – a big reward for being bold.



USING OUR POWERS FOR GOOD

In addition to making grants, the foundation leverages its influence by convening, educating, and advocating for our grantees, other funders and our shared goals. Rather than working in isolation, we activate networks to help grantees solve problems, raise funds, partner effectively and encourage innovation.

We've built relationships through Austin Area Funders, Central Texas Education Funders, Philanthropy Advocates, the Creative Learning Initiative, Grantmakers for Education, and Washington Regional Area Grantmakers. In our early days, colleagues guided us to resources, advised us on operations, and shared their grant-making strategies. Over the years they've become key partners in supporting the issues we care about.























Commitment to Collaboration

In 2008, the Webber Family Foundation co-founded **Central Texas Education** Funders (CTEF) to help foundations learn from each other and partner more effectively. CTEF has grown from 12 member foundations in 2008 to 75 today. In addition, CTEF is credited as the genesis of Philanthropy Advocates, a statewide group of foundations that formed in 2011 to advocate at the Texas legislature for increased investments in education.

CTEF offers networking, site visits, and tools for grant-makers and grant-seekers, including:

CTEF has streamlined the grant process for many grantees and improved grant-makers' effectiveness through collective learning, funding and advocacy.







THE IMPACT OF PARTNER GRANTS

To help nonprofits maximize their impact, since 2008 the Webber Family Foundation has offered multi-year, general operating grants to organizations whose missions are closely aligned with our goals. We call these grantees our "Partners."

Building on strong, trusting relationships, we began offering this type of support to reduce the time grantees were spending on the application and reporting processes; provide stability necessary for growth; allow flexibility for longer-term projects, changing times and opportunities; and encourage strategic risk-taking.

In total, the WFF has awarded over \$7.3 million - in both capacity building and general operating grants - to our Partners. We hear time and again how this type of support is critical for meeting community needs.

The featured 12 nonprofits in this report are long-time, highperforming Partners. Over the years, we have learned tremendously from them and have developed a deep sense of trust, collegiality and respect. We are proud to support them and applaud their growth and impact.
